

Main Street Community Foundation, Inc. is a public charity committed to partnering with individuals, families and businesses who wish to build permanent charitable connections, now and for generations to come. We support and better the communities of Bristol, Burlington, Plainville, Plymouth, Southington and Wolcott, Connecticut. Since 1995, the Foundation has provided opportunities to donors to support the causes they believe in and to help further their desire to give back and improve their community.

Fighting Food Insecurity Among Adult Students

Food insecurity is one of the largest issues in our local communities, and it is especially an issue among students. That includes adult students who are enrolled in High School Completion and ESL programs and may be providing for other family members. **Bristol Adult Education Center** (**BAEC**), which serves Bristol, Southington and surrounding towns, noticed that many of their students come to class without having eaten breakfast or dinner; the morning classes are from 9am-12pm and evening classes are 5pm-8pm. The students are often busy getting their family situated for the day, coming directly from work or are experiencing food insecurity. Marie Patrick, the School Counselor at BAEC, stated that the few instances when they do have food available to the students, the teachers and staff have commented that students were more engaged and focused.

This sentiment was echoed by several adult education organizations at an annual meeting at BAEC during the summer. MSCF decided to fund a snack pantry for students at BAEC. The food is ready-to-eat, healthy, high in fiber and can be easily eaten during class. This pilot program was funded with a Strategic Response grant from the **Money in Motion Fund**, an unrestricted fund that addresses a broad range of community goals and issues through proactive grantmaking. Since the snack pantry opened in June, not only have teachers at BAEC noticed increased attendance and attention, but there has been more socialization between the students resulting in the building of stronger relationships with one another.

Out in the Community

It has been a busy summer for MSCF – leading community conversations, convening organizations and awarding grants and scholarships, but the MSCF team also had the chance to get out in the community!

MSCF took the opportunity to present a grant to Southington's **Bread for Life** while serving dinner at the organization one night. Members of MSCF's Bradley Henry Barnes and Leila Upson Barnes Memorial Trust Advisory Committee and MSCF's staff regularly volunteer to help nonprofits in the community.



MSCF helped turn Bristol teal! In honor of Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month, a group of Bristol residents participate in Turn the Towns Teal every September to raise awareness of ovarian cancer and its symptoms. This campaign was created by Tony and Judie Lodovico, and is funded through the **Bristol Talks Teal Fund** that they established at MSCF in 2013.

When Main Street Community Foundation recently gathered over twenty grantee and community partners that specifically serve women and girls and asked them what they see as the most pressing needs, those three things rose to the top for nearly every organization. With that information, MSCF made those needs priority areas for the Women & Girls Fund fall grant cycle. Grant applications were submitted in September. Preserving Bristol's History

The preservation of history is an important and often overlooked aspect of maintaining and improving our vibrant communities, which is why MSCF is proud to support a restoration project at the **Memorial**Military Museum. MSCF awarded a \$2,500 grant to the Memorial Military Museum with distributions from the Bristol Brass General Grant Fund and the Karen and Kim Murphy Family Charitable Fund.

The grant supports the restoration of two WWII leather flight jackets that belonged to Bristol residents Warren Beach and Raymond Rich, and the preservation of these jackets will help ensure their memory and honor their service for years to come. The Memorial Military Museum is a place for the community to learn about Bristol's military history and promotes historical knowledge through their collection of military memorabilia. You can visit the Memorial Military Museum, located inside the Bristol Historical Society, at 98 Summer Street, Bristol.



New Funds Join MSCF Family



Bristol Police Memorial Fund

The Bristol Police Memorial Fund was established by the Bristol Police Benevolent Association to collect donations for the creation of a new memorial monument that will be built adjacent to the Bristol Police Department. This memorial will serve to honor five Bristol police officers who have lost their lives, including Lieutenant Dustin DeMonte and Sergeant Alex Hamzy who were killed in the line of duty in 2022. The project is being planned, organized and executed by members of the Bristol Police Benevolent Association in coordination with the City of Bristol Mayor's Office and Police Department.

Ann Gudegast Fund for the Bristol Boys & Girls Club

The Ann Gudegast Fund for the Bristol Boys & Girls Club will provide annual funding to the Boys & Girls Club of Bristol to support their programs and services that assist young women and girls develop healthy lifestyles, learn new skills, and build confidence. Ann Gudegast, a lifelong resident of Bristol, established this fund because of the time she spent after school at the Bristol Girls Club. Ann stated that "Of all the things I've been grateful for in my life, one of them would definitely be the Girls Club." Leaving a legacy was very important to Ann because she wanted to provide the same help and opportunities she was given when she was growing up.
