Main Street Community Foundation awards grants

Main Street Community Foundation, through its spring competitive grant cycle, has awarded grants totaling \$163,535 to 49 organizations, including \$11,352 in grants to four organizations benefiting Burlington. This round of grants will help these organizations meet the needs of local residents, from volunteer fire fighters to a high school crew team.

The Foundation assesses the needs of the communities it serves with distributions from over 30 endowed funds that were established by donors to support causes they care about, to meet those specific needs or reach a particular group of people.

Grant applications for this cycle are submitted once a year, and they are thoughtfully reviewed by 24 local residents that make up the Community Foundation's volunteer Distribution Committee. The Committee not only reviews all proposals, but also conducts site visits, and makes the final funding recommendations to the Foundation's Board of Directors. All of this is to ensure that the grants awarded are feasible and align with the donor's intent.
